III. Views expressed by participants

Birendra Thapaliya, FOHRID

Described about the relevance of Task Force to combat against Impunity, its past activities, campaign for ratification of Rome Statute of ICC conducted in the first week of 2007. He also briefly explained about outcomes of the meeting dated 9 May 2008, held at ICJ Office. The meeting had stressed need of advocacy and lobbying required to end impunity. Street drama staging (by COCAP) on importance of Rome Statute of ICC was appreciated and the participants opined that it should be continued and spread throughout the country. He explained about the agenda flowed through e-mail by Task Force on 11 May. Participants were requested to present their organizations' plans, individual or in collaboration for campaign against impunity.

Hari Bahadur Karki, AJAR Nepal

As the Task Force coordinated by FOHRID is leading this program, it should distribute responsibilities for the campaign identifying the specific expertise of each organization. Lets be specific on what activities to conduct such as press conference, public rally, street drama, pamphleting etc.

Dr. Sundar Mani Dikshit, CISOPED

What is the objective of the program? Diagnose the disease; identify what provisions we can insert in the new constitution. No one should get immunity from punishment. We should bring out concrete plans and recommend to the CA members to incorporate in the new constitution. Otherwise, this type of programs cannot yield any worthy result.

Ambar Raut, Advocacy Forum

I propose that the campaign against impunity should be forwarded collectively. We should determine whether to target the report of Mallik Commission or Rayamajhi Commission. Identify expertise and willingness of each organization for this campaign. Which areas should be focused, which are still left untouched? We should learn from the past experiences and weaknesses. We have filed PIL and FIR but they have not yielded concrete results. May be there is need of a specific law required? We can organize press conference, lobby with the political parties and CA members. Firstly, find out specific

causes contributing to impunity. Each of us should share what lapses they have seen in combating impunity.

Govinda Bandi, Advocate

We have been working to combat against impunity. But the campaign is still a great challenge. We have to make collective efforts to make impunity free new Nepal. The activities being conducted are case filing, advocacy, lobbying etc. Why not to make "Year against impunity", with one month in one theme. We can display slogan against impunity in our letter pad, diary, calendar and other publications. INSEC has practiced this in the past. With the successful campaign of human rights community, ICC has become buzz term in the society. Perpetrators now think seriously before involving in the incidents of violation of human rights. Impunity can be forwarded alongwith ICC. Victims are frustrated with the rights workers. They say that they are exploited and being misused for their earnings. May be we have some shortcomings.

We can start our 12 months campaign from coming June instead of July. We have to coordinate our programs. Lets share programs of individual organization and fit them into one calendar. Give lead role in a theme to certain organization - FOHRID or INSEC may coordinate campaign against killings, COCAP or INSEC on ICC and Advocacy Forum on disappearance. We should be limited to past violations, TRC process, lack of rule of law, non compliance of the State on ICC, justice, impunity. INGOs should support civil society initiative. They may issue press release supporting our initiative.

Bikash Ghimire, GEOC

I think that we have done enough to sensitize people on impunity. That's why people automatically raised slogan when Khum Bahadur Khadka and Govinda Raj Joshi participated a program. If a vehicle crushes a pedestrian there is very small compensation to the victim. There is indifference about the fate of the injured. We should cover taht under impunity.

Krishna Pathak

We must determine whether we should take week long or year long program. We can determine this by looking at the interest and experience of each of us.

Ram Krishna Kafle, SAHARA

Lets conduct this campaign throughout the year. We can organize consultations with different groups of experts. We should follow up till the constitution is finalized. We can broadcast ads in the media highlighting the issue.

Subash Darnal, COCAP

We must think on how much the constitution has accommodated impunity issue. Report of the Rayamajhi Commission can be implemented by the present government, no need to wait constitution. We can bring out significant changes within 6 months if we work collectively. Lets do year long campaign but with proper coordination.

Raju Prasad Chapagain, OHCHR Nepal

We should coordinate campaign against impunity. One week is not enough for this purpose. I just want to synthesize what other colleagues have said. Think about how to disseminate the message of the campaign. Everyone is concentrated upon how to make constitution now. This is right time for the campaign.

Sudha Khatiwada, Kathmandu Academy of Law

We have to create pressure to punish past violations, include provisions in the new constitution and avert future violations. Be careful to avoid impunity in the future. Lets divide work such as recommendation can be led by lawyers, dissemination of information by others. Lets ponder over why we could not punish past atrocities so that we can learn for the future.

Bishnu Khatri, Youth Action Nepal

All sectors of stakeholders including rights campaigners should be included in the team. Sub-committees can be formed for themes such as ICC, TRC, disappearance, torture, implementing reports of Rayamajhi. Individual organization should coordinate such sub-committees and inform other organizations to participate in the programs of its theme. The three member committee, formed already should be expanded to include all stakeholders.

Bhola Bhattarai, Amnesty International

We can prepare programs for lobbying with CA members. I support the idea of celebrating a week of each month with a specific theme.

Bijaya Kumar Son, COCAP

We have worked to sensitize youth on ICC through street drama. This activity was taken from Mechi to Mahakali. But we have not received expected support. We have planned to take it in the western region very soon with additional documentary show (being released at Yala Maya Kendra at 12 noon on 13 Jestha). The collection of the program will be used to fund our future campaign. I request you all to support to sustain such initiatives.
